Your Power as a Constituent

•It is important to be <u>political</u>, but <u>not partisan</u>

 Building an ongoing relationship with your MP is important

Your Power as a Constituent

- National bodies can bring limited pressure to bear on government.
- •MP's are most sensitive to the views of their constituents.
- MP's can influence their caucus.

Preparing

- Make an Appointment
- Know Your Subject
- Be Familiar with the Political Process

Preparing

- •Know Whom you Represent on whose behalf are you speaking? (yourself, your group, congregation...) Can't speak for the UCC but can speak as a member.
- Organize your Delegation

- Meet 15 min ahead at the MP's office, if going as a delegation
- Be articulate and concise
- Name why this issue is important to you (as a Christian, a UCC member, a citizen...)
- Don't speak too long

- Find out your MP's views
- Give the MP some good political reason why they should take a stand (useful polls etc)
- •Draw a commitment from them, that means you will have to get back in touch with them.

Would your MP be prepared to

- > Raise the issue in their caucus
- > Make a public statement
- > Ask a question in Parliament
- Talk to another MP or cabinet minister on your behalf
- Write a letter raising your concerns
- Raise the issue at a party meeting
- > Sign a petition

• What if my MP raises a question I can't answer? Promise to follow up, and then contact the Mining Justice Network, the Open for Justice Campaign, or staff in the GCO office.

•Leave information with your MP – offer supportive material (UCC letters, briefing notes, stories...) that will remind your MP of your concerns

Follow-Up

- Send a thankyou note or e-mail
- If you have promised any further information, deliver it soon
- Make sure your MP honours any commitment made to you. Contact them to find out if you don't hear within 2 weeks.

Follow-Up

- Debrief with your delegationwhat worked and what didn't?
- Communicate with allies –
 network, regional groups, GCO.
- Re-engage with your MP as new developments arise.
